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DETERMINING BBP EXPOSURE PROCEDURE

Adult exposure to BLOOD

If any part of your body touches visible blood from a child (or an adult), immediately inform your site supervisor, contact the Human Resources Department and follow the *Bloodborne Pathogen Post-Exposure Procedure*.

Child BITES an adult

- 1. If a child bites you and the bite breaks your skin, look for sores, cuts, abrasions, rash or blood on the child's lips and mouth (inside and out). If any of these are present, immediately begin the *Bloodborne Pathogen Exposure Procedure*.
- 2. If a child bites you, but the bite does not break the skin, thoroughly wash the bite area with soap and water immediately. Follow *the Biting Incident Procedure* in the Health Policy and Procedures

Child SCRATCHES an adult

- 1. If a child scratches you and the scratch breaks your skin, look for sores, cuts, abrasions, rash or blood on the child's hands. If any of these are present, immediately begin the *Bloodborne Pathogen Post-Exposure Procedure*.
- 2. If a child scratches you, but the scratch does not break the skin, thoroughly wash the scratched area with soap and water immediately.

Child SPITS ON an adult

- 1. If a child spits on you and the spit gets in a mucus membrane (eye, mouth, nose, ear) or any area where your skin is broken or compromised, look for sores, cuts, abrasions, rash or blood on the child's lips and mouth (inside and out). If any of these are present, immediately begin the *Bloodborne Pathogen Post-Exposure Procedure*.
- 2. If a child spits on you, but the spit only touches in-tact skin, thoroughly wash the affected area with soap and water immediately.
