OUR STORY



Southern Oregon Child and Family Council, Inc. (SOCFC) has provided services to families facing economic hardships in Jackson and Josephine counties for over 50 years; in Jackson County since 1967 and in Josephine County since 1989. In 1995 Southern Oregon Child and Family Council, Inc. became the first grantee in the state of Oregon to provide Early Head Start (EHS) services.





Currently Southern Oregon Head Start serves a total of 946 children and their families. In the Head Start (3–5) program we serve 781 children and their families, and 164 infants, toddlers and pregnant woman in the Early Head Start (0–3) program. Over the last 6 years on average, 5,000 children from the ages of 0–5 qualify each year for Head Start and Early Head Start Services.

Children who attend Early Head Start and Head Start are given opportunities to learn and to grow, socially, emotionally, and physically. They also receive free healthy meals and snacks, health, dental and developmental screenings and enjoy playing and learning in a safe, educational setting with qualified, caring teachers. Accommodations are also offered to meet the special needs of children who experience disabilities.



OUR PROGRAMS



HEAD START

Children ages 3 to 5 who attend free Head Start preschool are given opportunities to learn and to grow socially, emotionally, and physically. They also receive free, healthy meals and snacks, health and dental screenings and enjoy playing and learning in a safe, educational setting. Accommodations are also offered to meet the special needs of children who experience disabilities.

EARLY HEAD Start

LISTO is a literacy program for the entire family under one roof, supporting all family members with their educational needs and goals. LISTO promotes bilingual literacy through:


- A supportive pre-school environment in Spanish for 3, 4, and 5 year-olds

THE FAMILY Connection







EXPENDITURES 2022


