On Tuesday, November 7, the LISTO Family Literacy Program held a Parent and Child Time Together Literacy Event for our Preschool age children and their parents. We were hosted by the Jackson County Library Services at the Medford Branch. We had a great turnout, 18 LISTO families enjoyed the afternoon with us (18 parents and 23 children)!

The Children's Library bilingual staff (Nick) read The Little Mouse, The Red Ripe Strawberry, and The Big Hungry Bear to the children and families. They also had a tour of the library, worked on a related art project, and enjoyed snacks together!

LISTO's Parent and Child Time Together Literacy Event

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Building trust at work is a gradual process that requires time and effort. According to a recent article in the Harvard Business Review, acknowledging the emotions of others can foster trust. <u>Verbal recognition of someone</u> <u>else's feelings is perceived as an effortful act and can help form deeper</u> <u>connections with them.</u>

Here are some tips for building trust at work:

1. **Communicate with coworkers**: Open communication is key to building trust. <u>Be **transparent and honest** in your interactions with your col-</u> <u>leagues</u>.

2. **Follow through on promises**: One way to build trust is by doing what you say you intend to do. <u>If someone is relying on you, make sure you fol-</u><u>low through on your commitments.</u>

3. **Be consistent**: Consistency is important in building trust. <u>Be reliable</u> and dependable in your actions and words.

4. **Pay attention to non-verbal communication**: Non-verbal cues such as body language and tone of voice can convey a lot of information. <u>Pay at-</u><u>tention to these cues to better</u> <u>understand your colleagues</u>.

Remember, building trust takes time and effort, but it is essential for creating a positive and productive work environment.
